

EXECUTIVE **SUMMARY**



This report highlights activities implemented by the Foundation and its partners in the course of 2019. The report underscores that projects supported in 2019 focused on improving access to quality healthcare and education opportunities for Nigerians in 15 states.

2019 marked ten years of responsive grantmaking by the TY Danjuma Foundation. Our first decade has been a remarkable journey of touching lives. Since inception in 2009, the Foundation has supported over 280 projects across 30 states in preventing blindness and other diseases of the poor as well as in promoting access to quality healthcare, education and economic opportunities.

In 2019, the Foundation intensified its support for interventions that provide quality healthcare to underserved Nigerians, combat neglected tropical diseases (NTDs), and offer humanitarian support to internally displaced persons (IDPs). We also doubled our effort in enhancing access to quality education. As we turn the leaf on the first decade of the Foundation's existence, I am immensely grateful to our grantees, the Board of Trustees and staff of the Foundation for the continuous support towards the successes recorded in 2019.




Promoting Access to Quality and Affordable Healthcare




Maternal, Neonatal & Child Health (MNCH)

Nigeria has a high level of maternal and under five mortality. According to the World Health Organisation (2019), 20% of global maternal deaths happen in Nigeria. In 2019, the Foundation prioritised its support for MNCH initiatives that promote safe delivery and wellbeing of underfives through training and re-training of health workers and skilled birth attendants, provision of safe delivery kits, promoting uptake of prevention of mother to child transmission of HIV services, provision of emergency transportation systems and strengthening of referral systems. The Foundation is committed to supporting interventions that will assist with reversing the poor indices on Maternal and Child Health.



There is increasing evidence from the field that exposing women to knowledge on the importance of ante-natal care (ANC) has a corresponding increase in the uptake of health services at primary healthcare facilities.

The line chart above shows an increase in ANC attendance and facility delivery by beneficiaries of a maternal and child healthcare project implemented in Mashegu, Munya and Lavun LGAs of Niger state. The project established an effective emergency transport scheme with the aim of improving access to quality integrated maternal and child healthcare services for pregnant women in the 3 LGAs.







Preventable Blindness

TY BANJUMA

Screening for visual impairments in Edo state.

The national blindness and visual impairment survey for Nigeria (2008) estimates that 1.1 million Nigerian adults are blind and an additional 3 million have visual impairments. Overall, 42 out of every 1000 adults aged 40 and above are blind. It is also estimated that 88% of the blindness and visual impairments in Nigerian are due to avoidable causes; most commonly cataract. Hence, in 2019, the Foundation continued to provide funding for comprehensive eye care services in underserved communities and public schools in high need states. Over 5,000 persons benefited from the interventions.




Combating Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs)

Since inception, the Foundation has continued to support efforts aimed at combating NTDs in Taraba State through mass administration of medicine (MAM). Data from the World Health Organisation (WHO) indicates that Nigeria suffers from 13 of the 17 NTDs; including all five of the most common - Lymphatic Filariasis (elephantiasis), Onchocerciasis (River Blindness), Schistosomiasis (Bilharzia), Soil-transmitted Helminth (Intestinal Worms), and Trachoma.

In 2019, the Foundation continued to provide support for biannual mass drug administration (MDA) to combat NTDs (Lymphatic Filariasis and Onchocerciasis) in Taraba State.

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Free Surgical Procedures

In addition to their health challenge, persons with facial deformities suffer stigmatisation and diminished self-esteem that impact on their dignity. In 2019, the Foundation provided funds for the correction of 50 facial deformities in a bid to restore the health, dignities and selfesteem of the affected persons.



Water, Sanitation & Hygiene


In line with sustainable development goals (SDG); especially goal 6 on providing clean water & sanitation, the Foundation continued its support to projects that offer viable solutions to poor hygiene and portable water shortages in needy communities.

One of the communities that benefited from the Foundation's support for water, hygiene and sanitation is Ukpanda community in Utugwang, Obudu Local Government Area of Cross River state. The Foundation donated a solar powered borehole that provides 10,000 litres of water to the community.

The Foundation sustained its support to internally displaced persons in Borno, Adamawa, Plateau state and the Federal Capital Territory. Projects implemented in these states provided succour, health and services and access to education to displaced persons; especially orphans and vulnerable children (OVCs), girls and widows.

Hurera Yahaya

Amina Yahaya is as grateful as any mother would be to see her little daughter Hurera full of life and engaged in activities like any other child her age should. Barely a year ago, Amina's countenance was full of sadness as Hurera was very sickly due to severe acute malnutrition that had defied medical interventions in her community in Bali LGA of Taraba State. This is her story:

"Three (3) months after I gave birth to Hurera's condition was so bad that people Hurera, she became very ill, I took her to after several failed attempts to treat her, I had no option but to take her to local herbalists and traditional practitioners around Bali with the hope of getting some form of help.

Surprisingly, after 3 weeks my daughter's condition began to improve and she put on some weight. Before the intervention, Hurera could not sit down, but within 3 weeks of treatment, she started sitting and walking on her own. Nevertheless, I kept going to the center every week for her routine checkup until Hurera fully recovered and is now a healthy and happy child.



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

Support for Girl-Child Education

In 2019, the Foundation sought to facilitate access to quality education for the girl child (5-15years) at the primary and post primary level, in line with the Sustainable Development Goals number 4 which is focused on ensuring "inclusive and quality education

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Teachers' Training

There was a renewed emphasis in 2019 on supporting projects that enhance the capacity of teachers for effective curriculum delivery, classroom management and improvised use of teaching aids.

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To increase enrolment, retention and completion rates in primary schools, the Foundation continued to provide meals to pupils in two focused schools -Fadama primary school in Takum, Taraba state, and Dako LEA primary school in Dako Community, in the outskirts of the Federal Capital Territory.

Channels International Kids Cup

The Foundation's support included funding for the local organising committee; distribution of exercise books The funds renovated class buildings and sporting facilities, equipped computer labs, provided instructional materials and purchased sporting kits. For all participating schools; and provision of prize money to the top three winning schools.


