

ABOUT THE FOUNDATION

The TY Danjuma Foundation is a private independent philanthropic grantmaking organisation committed to improving the quality of life of Nigerians by supporting health and education interventions implemented by non-governmental organisations (NGOs) registered and working in Nigeria. The Foundation was established in 2009 by Lt. Gen. Theophilus Yakubu Danjuma, GCON - a retired Nigerian Army Chief of Staff, an astute and successful businessman. The Foundation is based in Abuja, Nigeria with state offices in Taraba and Edo.

Vision

To contribute to building a Nigeria where all citizens have access to affordable quality health care, education, and equal opportunities to realise their potentials.

Mission

The TY Danjuma Foundation is committed to enhacing the quality of life of Nigerians by supporting initiatives that improve access to health and educational opportunities.

Main Goals

- Enhance community healthcare by providing free medical services rural communities which lack adequate medical facilities;
- Improve access to quality education for children and young people; and
- Alleviate extreme poverty and hardship in communities across the country by providing humanitarian support, clean drinking water and encouraging the empowerment of women.



General TY Danjuma is deeply patriotic and has served in key political positions, including; the Chairman of the Presidential policy Advisory Committee (1999), the Honourable Minister of Defence (1999-2003) and Chairman of the Presidential Advisory Council (2010).

General TY Danjuma is also a philanthropist. He has a solid track record of philanthropic giving, which culminated in the establishment of the TY Danjuma Foundation.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY



Gima H. Forje Chief Executive Officer

This report summarises activities implemented by the Foundation and its partners in the 2021 grant cycle. A total of 28 projects were implemented in 13 states, including the Federal Capital Territory. The report notes that the interventions created access to quality and affordable healthcare for people in need, and broadened the horizon for accessing quality education in deprived communities.

The bulk of the Foundation's funding under the health programme in 2021 was directed towards maternal and child health in order to deal with the persistent challenges confronted by women of child bearing age, newborns and children. Through our signature programme on maternal and childhealth - "Healthy Mother, Healthy Child" - the Foundation supported evidence-based and innovative interventions that increase the proportion of women and children with access to skilled healthcare providers by sharpening the capacity of healthcare workers to provide quality maternal and child health services.

Importantly, the Foundation crossed a major milestone in 2021 with the completion and commissioning of the Kuru Danjuma Hospital for Children (KDHC) in Takum, Taraba state. The investment in the KDHC is a testament of our Founder's commitment to promoting the health and wellbeing of children in Nigeria. Since opening its doors, the KDHC has been providing quality and affordable paediatric healthcare services to the people of Takum and its environs.

In continuation of efforts aimed at ensuring that everyone in Nigeria has access to quality and affordable eyecare, the Foundation invested in comprehensive integrated eye health initiatives through its signature programme - "Vision for a Brighter Future" - reaching over 7,000 beneficiaries. Our work in eye health focused on raising awareness on blindness and visual impairments, screening and treating various eye conditions amongst patients in need, and training health workers to provide quality eyecare services.

Building on the legacy of our Founder over the last two decades in combating Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs) or diseases of neglected people, the Foundation consolidated its investments in the control and elimination of Lymphatic Filariasis and Onchocerciasis in Taraba State by training health workers, community directed distributors (CDDs) on mass drug administration, and by supporting evaluations to ascertain the level of control and elimination in endemic communities. Through this coordinated approach, over 1.9 million beneficiaries were reached in 2021 with treatments for Lymphatic Filariasis and Onchocerciasis.

In sync with our commitment to promoting access to inclusive quality education, the Foundation expanded its investment in strengthening the ability of teachers for effective classroom delivery of curriculum to learners. Support was also provided for the renovation of libraries as part of efforts to promote a culture of reading in Nigeria.

Overall, 2021 was a fulfilling year for the Foundation. We are grateful to all our partners for their commitment and dedication in taking services across the country into communities in need. Through concerted effort, we were able to weather the storm occasioned by the COVID-19 pandemic and marshalled on to provide the needed support.

Geographical Spread of 2021 Projects
















In 2021, the Foundation invested in 12 community health projects across 9 states - Akwa-Ibom, Bayelsa, Borno, Edo, Kaduna, Nasarawa, Plateau, Sokoto, Taraba, and the Federal Capital Territory (FCT).


Funding for health projects focused on preventing blindness, improving maternal & child health, providing free medical and surgical services in rural communities, combating neglected tropical diseases (NTDs), and providing support to internally displaced persons (IDPs).

Support for Quality & Affordable Healthcare









According to the Nigeria Demographic and Health Survey (2018 NDHS), the rate of under-five mortality is 132 deaths per 1,000 live births, while the infant mortality rate is 67 deaths per 1,000 live births. Maternal mortality ratio is 512 deaths per 100,000 live births. Thus, for every 1,000 live births in Nigeria, about five women die during pregnancy, childbirth, or within two months of childbirth. The report also notes that 80% of married women have the potential of high-risk birth while 63% of infants are at elevated odds of dying from avoidable risks. Clearly, there is a need for continuous investment in promoting maternal and child health.

To contribute in reversing the high rate of maternal and new-born mortality, the TY Danjuma Foundation supports evidence-based, innovative, high quality and sustainable interventions that ensure mothers can experience a healthy pregnancy and childbirth, and children can thrive to realise their full potential through its "Healthy Mother, Healthy Child" programme.

In 2021, the Foundation continued to support interventions that improve the quality of service delivered at primary healthcare centres across Nigeria. Projects supported increased access to integrated maternal, new-born and child health (IMNCH) services for pregnant women through initiatives that promote the uptake of antenatal care (ANC) services and enhance the prevention of mother to child transmission of HIV (PMTCT).

Resources were also channelled into initiatives aimed at building lifesaving skills for health workers and traditional birth attendants through targeted trainings in safe approaches to maternal and neonatal healthcare.

Rufkatu Danjuma Maternity (RDM) & Kuru Danjuma Hospital for Children (KDHC)

The TY Danjuma Foundation expanded the Rufkatu Danjuma Maternity complex in Takum to include a specialised trailblazing paediatric facility named Kuru Danjuma Hospital for Children (KDHC) in 2021. The primary aim of the KDHC is to lead, define and provide affordable world-class paediatric healthcare services centred on health promotion, disease prevention and quality treatment to ensure a healthy child. The co-location of the KDHC with the Rufkatu Danjuma Maternity (RDM) facilitates synergy and encourages efficient transfer from neonatal to paediatric care. This promotes confidence on the part of mothers and families who can return to the same location for sustained care throughout the vulnerable years of a child's development.



Beyond contributing to addressing the challenges of maternal and child health in and around Takum, the KDHC and RDM have strengthened the health systems in the Local Government Area and positively impacted the socio-economic status of the communities in the area by providing a variety of job opportunities.

Throughout the year, the KDHC and RDM provided exceptional maternal, neonatal and child care services to the people of Takum and its environs.

According to the International Agency for the Prevention of Blindness, ninety percent of blindness can be prevented or treated. In addition, data from the Nigeria Demographic and Health Survey of 2018 indicates that difficulty in seeing is the most prominent type of disability in Nigeria, with 8% of women and 9% of men 15 years and older having difficulties seeing. The scale of the challenge of visual impairment means every investment to turn the tide is worthwhile.


Broad-based collaboration is essential in ensuring quality eye health services are available to people at the grassroots. The TY Danjuma Foundation is committed to improving access to eye care services that will prevent blindness through targeted screening, treatment, surgery and training of health workers on eye health.

In 2021, the Foundation supported 5 projects aimed at addressing avoidable blindness through integrated comprehensive free eye health outreaches that promote access to eye care and improve vision. The projects enhanced the capacity of community health workers in primary eye care and trained teachers in primary and secondary schools to identify simple eye conditions amongst pupils. The Foundation also provided free treatments and surgeries to patients with various eye conditions.






Free Medical & Surgical Outreaches

Free medical and surgical outreaches are a crucial component in the Foundation's strategy in bringing healthcare closer to the poor. In the course of the year, the Foundation continued its support for free outreaches targeted at addressing health challenges for populations living in hard-to-reach and underserved communities.

In 2021, the Foundation supported 3 projects with the aim of taking free healthcare to people in rural communities. The projects provided access to a variety of surgical procedures such as cleft and maxillo-facial repairs for people in need from across the country at the Federal Medical Centre, Keffi. The services also included specialised procedures such as tonsillectomy, hysterectomy, myomectomy, exploratory laparotomy, and bone fracture fixation for indigent people in Wassa IDP Camp, Abuja and at the Usmanu Danfodiyo University Teaching Hospital, Sokoto.





Combating Neglected Tropical Diseases

Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTD) are categorised by the World Health Organisation as communicable diseases that are predominantly found in the rural poor communities of low-income tropical and subtropical countries and affect about 1.5 billion people globally.

According to the Federal Ministry of Health, Nigeria is battling with 14 out of the 20 NTDs recognised by the WHO with more than 120 million people living at risk of contracting at least one NTD. The most common NTDs in Nigeria are; Lymphatic Filariasis (Elephantiasis), Onchocerciasis (River Blindness), Schistosomiasis (Bilharzia), Soil-transmitted Helminths and Trachoma.

Although safe and cost-effective measures of prevention and control of NTDs exist, they have continued to cause severe suffering and lifetime disabilities for the poor and vulnerable in underserved communities due to neglect.

In 2021, the Foundation continued to consolidate on over two decades of work in the control and elimination of Lymphatic Filariasis and Onchocerciasis in Taraba state by Gen.TY Danjuma through training of health workers and community directed distributors for mass drug administration and by supporting evaluations to ascertain the level of control and elimination of these NTDs in endemic communities.

Support to Internally Displaced Persons

The UN Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) noted in its February 4, 2021 situation report on Nigeria that 8.7 million people were in need of urgent humanitarian asistance while 5.7 million people were at risk of critical food insecurity. To bring relief to these displaced persons, the Foundation provided support to displaced persons in Taraba State fleeing from crisis across the borders and continued its response to the humanitarian crisis in the north-east with a food and nutrition intervention for internally displaced persons (IDPs) in the new stadium IDPs camp in Maiduguri, Borno state.

In 2021, the Foundation deepened its investments aimed at bringing relief to displaced persons in the country. The interventions involved the purchase and distribution of food items, and facility-based training for pregnant and lactating women on infant and young child feeding in emergencies (IYCF-E). Food items were distributed to a total of 2,888 IDPs from 500 households. 302 pregnant women received birthing kits and were trained on IYCF-E. The intervention also distributed vitamin A supplements and albendazole for the deworming of 1,488 children under 5.

"The TY Danjuma Foundation and Initiative for the Development of the Next Generation (NEXTGEN) in the months of June and August 2021 renovated our Primary Health Centre (PHC) at Evbuomodu which was an eyesore prior to the intervention.

Its appearance was so bad that it was a key reason people avoided services at the PHC. Thankfully, the timely intervention has improved the facility, making it one of the most attractive centres in my Local Government Area (L.G.A.) The renovation contributed largely to the increasing inflow of healthcare seekers to the health center, especially during immunisations and for treatment of other minor ailments.

As part of the intervention, equipment such as manual suctioning machines, baby weighing scales, sphygmomanometers, artery forceps, delivery beds and examination couches were handed over to us at the health center in the presence of community leaders.

The wonderful and insightful training for health workers in the LGA that took place in March, 2021 was for me the best part of the intervention. My practice has seen improvement as I know better what to do at each stage during delivery.

On behalf of the staff of the health facility, I would like to say a very big thank you to NEXTGEN and TY Danjuma Foundation.




Geographical Spread

Improving Teaching Quality


The Sustainable Development Goal 4 (SDG-4) is the education goal; comprising 10 targets that are all hinged on ensuring inclusive equitable quality education and promoting lifelong learning opportunities for all. Specifically, target 4.c of the goal aims at significantly increasing the supply of qualified teachers especially in developing countries through teachers' training.

In sync with the SDG-4 targets, the TY Danjuma Foundation is supporting projects that sharpen the ability of teachers for effective classroom delivery of curriculum to learners. Specifically, in the 2021 grants cycle, the Foundation supported four teachers' training projects in 4 states - Edo, Taraba, Plateau and Yobe. Instructional materials were also donated to the schools to facilitate effective communication between teachers and pupils.








School Feeding

Millions of children are out of school partly because they cannot afford one meal a day. This is why the TY Danjuma Foundation is the first to support non governmental organisations to focus on providing one balanced meal a day to pupils in Dako LEA primary school in the Federal Capital Territory and Fadama primary school in Takum, Taraba state. In 2021, the Foundation continued its support to both schools. The result has been an increase in enrolment and performance by the pupils.

Promoting a Culture of Reading

Several reports have noted a deficiency in reading culture among Nigerian children. As part of efforts to promote a culture of reading, the Foundation is investing in the establishment of libraries in communities across Nigeria.

In 2021, the Foundation supported the establishment of libraries in Ewu community of Edo state and Igbo-Ukwu town in Anambra state. The Foundation also supported the township primary school in Kwande LGA of Benue state and a learning centre for displaced persons in Akwa Ibom state. Preliminary results indicate patronage by community members.
