The TY Danjuma Foundation is a private independent philanthropic grant-making organisation committed to improving the quality of life of Nigerians by supporting health and education interventions implemented by Non-Governmental Organisations (NGOs) registered and working in Nigeria. The Foundation was established in 2009 by Lt. Gen. Theophilus Yakubu Danjuma, GCON - a retired Nigerian Army Chief of Staff, an astute and successful businessman. The Foundation is based in Abuja, Nigeria with state offices in Taraba and Edo.

Among the companies he created is the NAL-COMET Group, which is one of Nigeria's most successful indigenous shipping agencies and terminal operators in Nigeria and South Atlantic Petroleum Ltd.- an oil exploration and production company set to become one of the largest indigenous oil producers in Africa.

General TY Danjuma is deeply patriotic and has served in key political positions, including; the Chairman of the Presidential Policy Advisory Committee (1999), the Honourable Minister of Defence (1999-2003), and Chairman of the Presidential Advisory Council (2010).

General TY Danjuma is also a philanthropist with a solid track record of philanthropic giving which culminated in the establishment of the TY Danjuma Foundation.

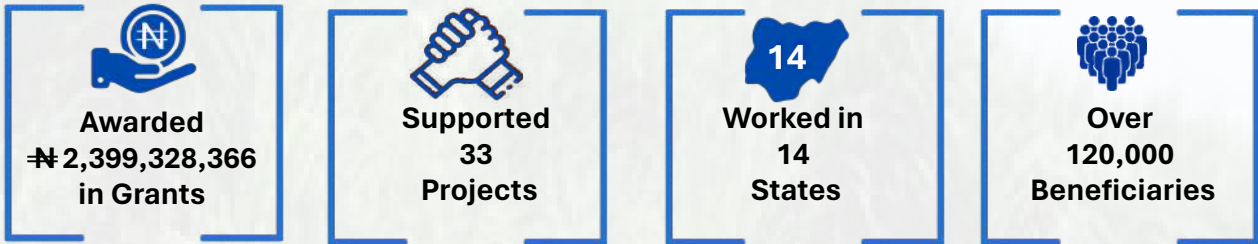

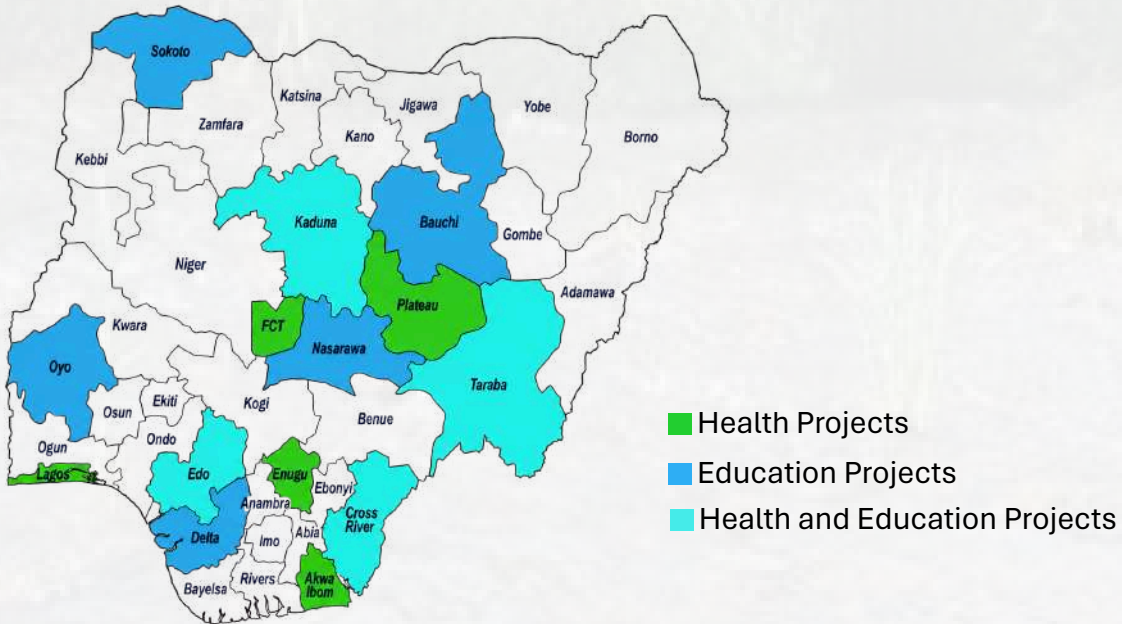
Looking ahead, the Foundation remains wholeheartedly dedicated to improving the quality of life and fostering truly inclusive development throughout Nigeria.

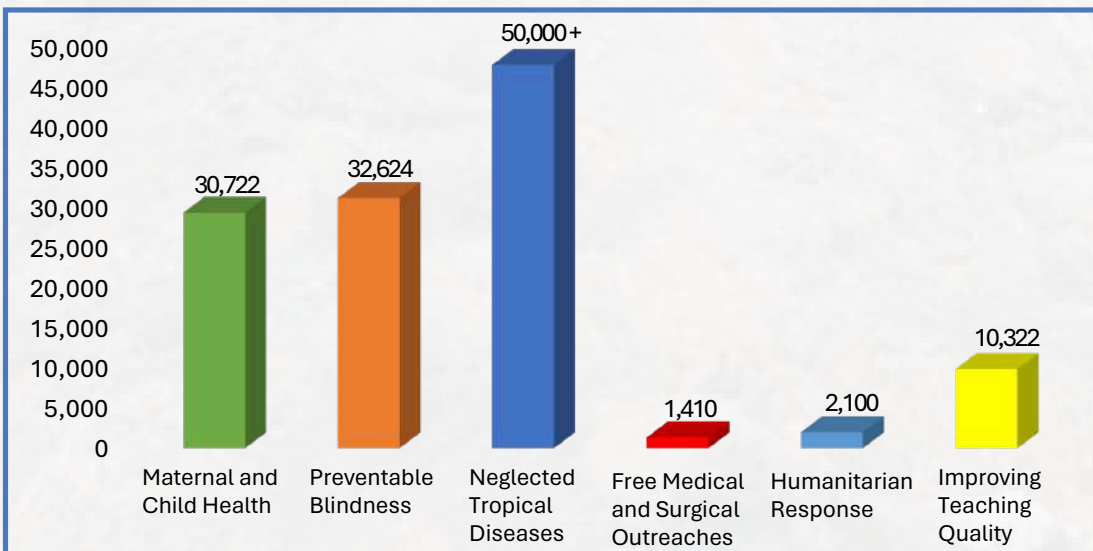


Geographical Spread of 2025 Projects

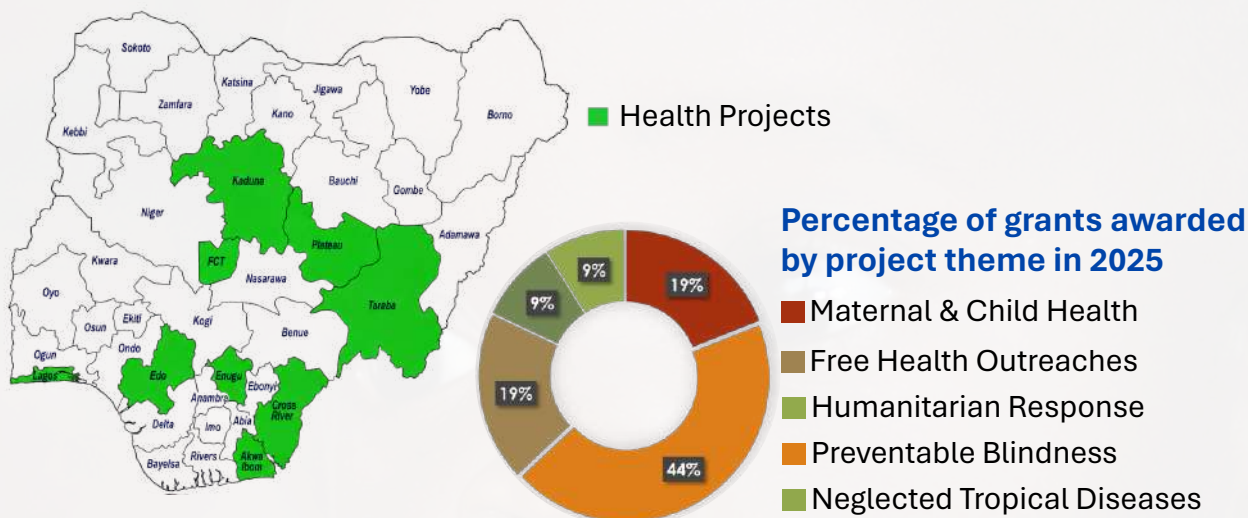
Overview of 2025 Health Programme

In 2025, the Foundation invested in 11 health grantees to enhance access to quality and affordable healthcare in 9 states including the Federal Capital Territory (FCT).

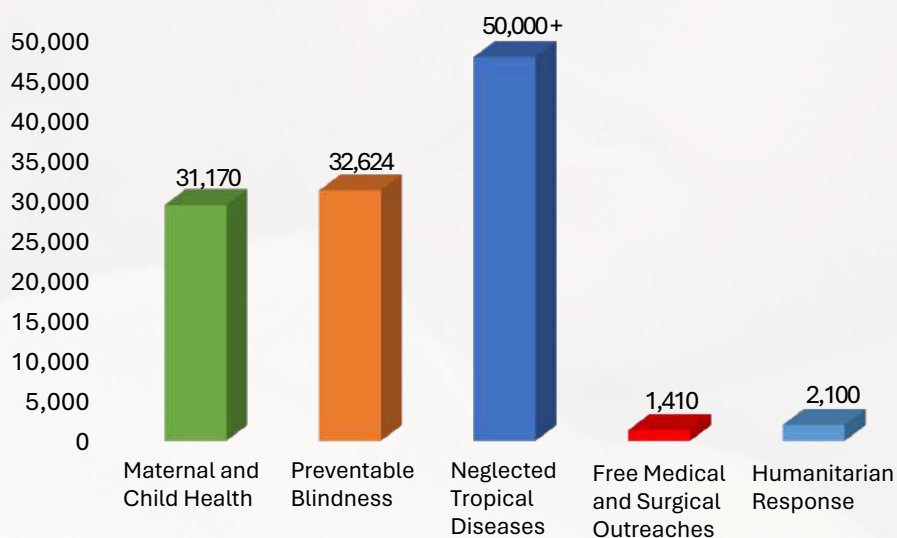
The funding for health projects focused on reducing preventable blindness, improving maternal & child health, providing free medical services in rural communities, combating neglected tropical diseases (NTDs), and providing support to internally displaced persons (IDPs).

Maternal & Child Health

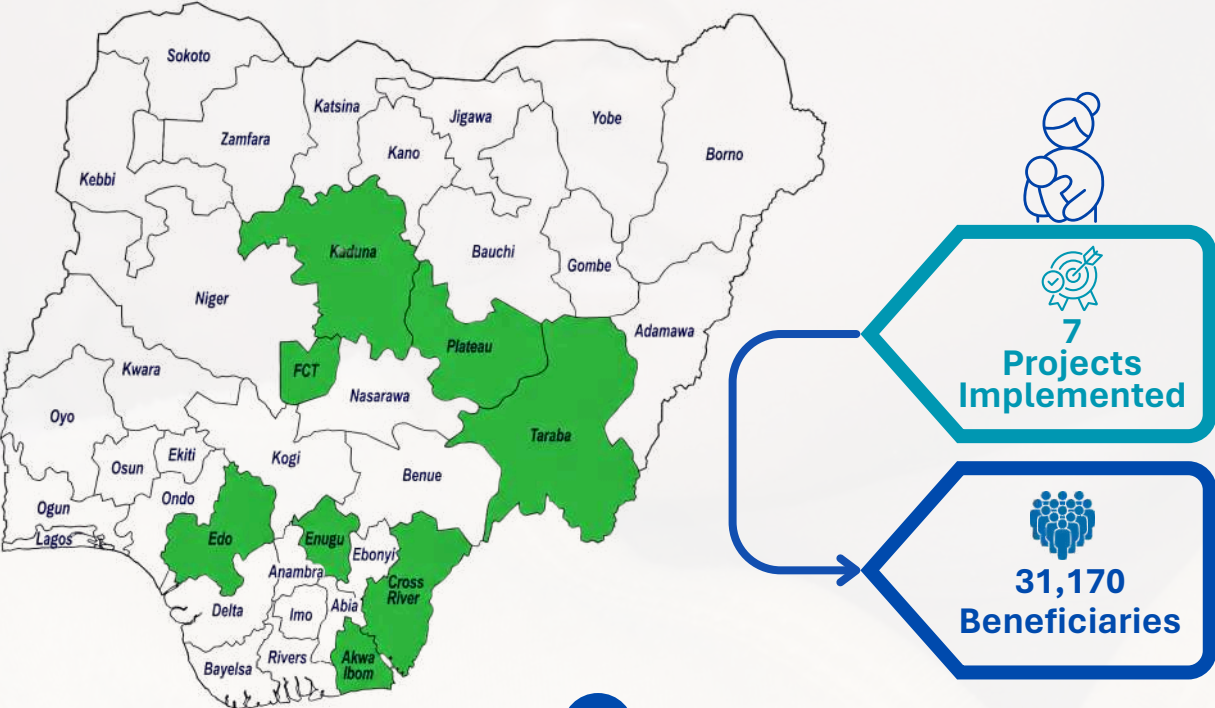
Grants awarded under the 2025 cycle of the “Healthy Mother, Healthy Child” programme significantly enhanced access to quality and affordable healthcare services for women and children, with a strong focus on rural communities across Nigeria.

These grants strengthened the healthcare system by training health workers and Traditional Birth Attendants (TBAs), enabling them to deliver higher-quality maternal and child health services. Key initiatives include:









- Promoting greater uptake of antenatal care (ANC) services
- Combating malnutrition through the provision of food supplements to children under five
- Preventing mother-to-child transmission of HIV (PMTCT)

The overarching goal of the "Healthy Mother, Healthy Child" programme is to reduce Nigeria’s persistently high maternal and under-five mortality rates. According to recent WHO and UN estimates, these currently stand at approximately 993–1,047 maternal deaths per 100,000 live births and around 108–116 under-five deaths per 1,000 live births.

TY Danjuma Foundation Medical Centre (TYDF-MC)

In 2025, the TY Danjuma Foundation Medical Centre (TYDF-MC) advanced its commitment to quality healthcare through targeted investments in digital systems, modern clinical infrastructure, essential medical equipment, and workforce development.

At Rufkatu Danjuma Maternity and Kuru Danjuma Hospital for Children, the consistent delivery of 24-hour maternity services, strengthened neonatal care, and enhanced paediatric emergency services led to markedly improved health outcomes for high-risk mothers, newborns, and critically ill children. With upgraded diagnostics, surgical capabilities, reliable emergency transport, and robust routine immunization programmes, TYDF-MC solidified its position as the leading referral centre in Takum.

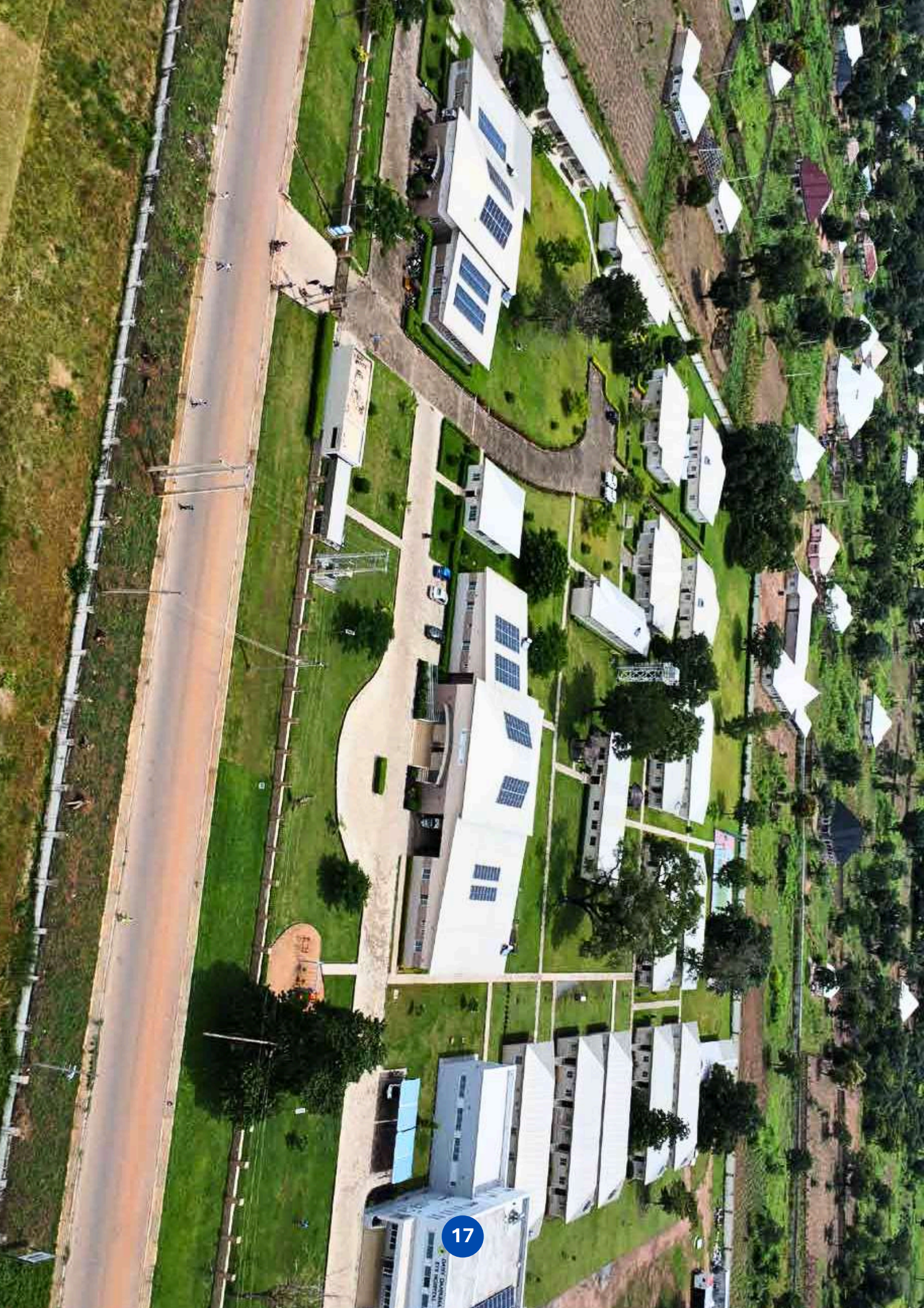
A major milestone in 2025 was the significant strengthening of neonatal services. The obstetric and newborn care teams implemented enhanced clinical protocols and innovative approaches that have laid a solid foundation for better neonatal survival rates.

Furthermore, specialised staff training supported by the World Health Organization (WHO) played a pivotal role in elevating service quality. The training focused on sharpening clinical competencies, strict adherence to standard treatment protocols, promoting patient safety, and leveraging data for informed decision-making — resulting in more consistent, effective, and high-quality maternal, newborn, and child healthcare throughout the year.

Goodwill Medical Centre Enugu

The Goodwill Medical Centre (GMC) in Enugu, which was built and equipped by the Foundation, experienced significant advancements in service delivery, maternal health outcomes, staff capacity building, and patient utilisation between 2024 and 2025. In 2025, GMC became the first non-governmental hospital in Nigeria to receive government approval to provide Comprehensive Emergency Obstetric and Newborn Care (CEmONC). This essential package comprises life-saving health services delivered in well-equipped facilities to address major obstetric and newborn complications.

Christian Reformed Church of Nigeria Hospital (CRC-N), Takum

The Christian Reformed Church of Nigeria (CRC-N) Hospital in Takum experienced a remarkable transformation, thanks to targeted investments from the TY Danjuma Foundation. Previously limited by infrastructural and operational challenges, the hospital underwent extensive renovations in 2025 and is now better equipped to provide reliable, patient-centred care.

As a result of the Foundation's investment, the hospital has seen improved facilities, expanded staffing, and renewed community trust. With the introduction of 24-hour medical and pharmaceutical services, supported by a strengthened workforce, access to essential care has significantly improved. Service quality has also been enhanced through the implementation of the HeliumOS Electronic Medical Records system, which enables more efficient patient management, improved accountability, and data-driven clinical decision-making.

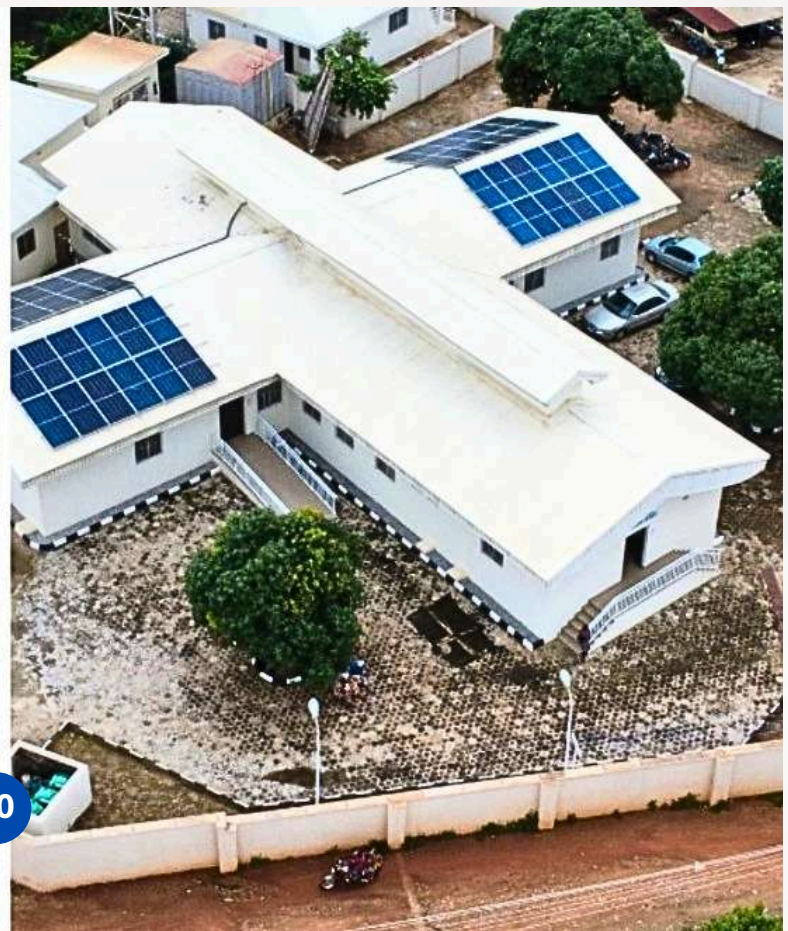
The hospital collaborates closely with TYDF-MC through coordinated referrals, shared training initiatives, and collaborative case management, all of which are contributing to improved health outcomes for families throughout the community.

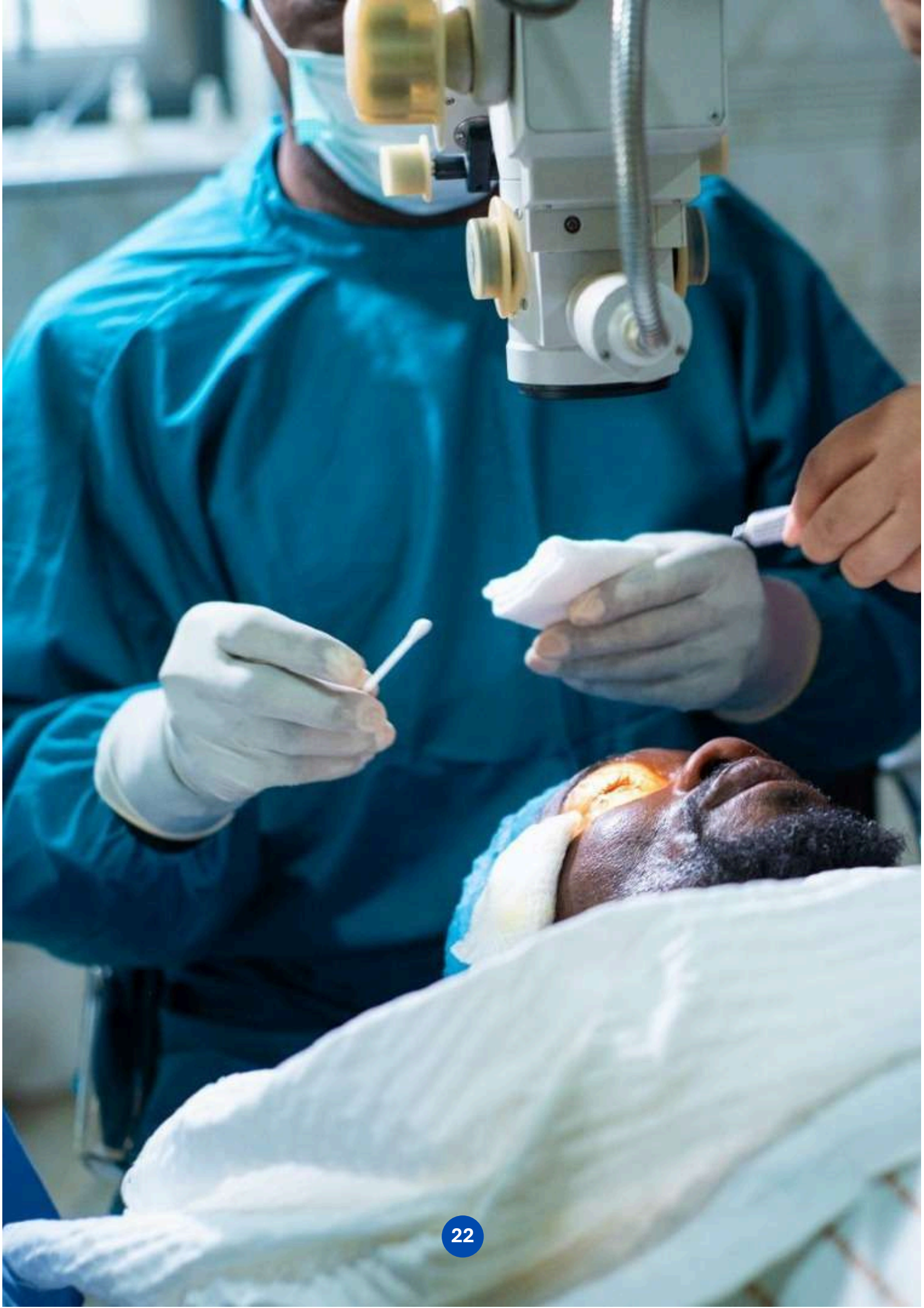

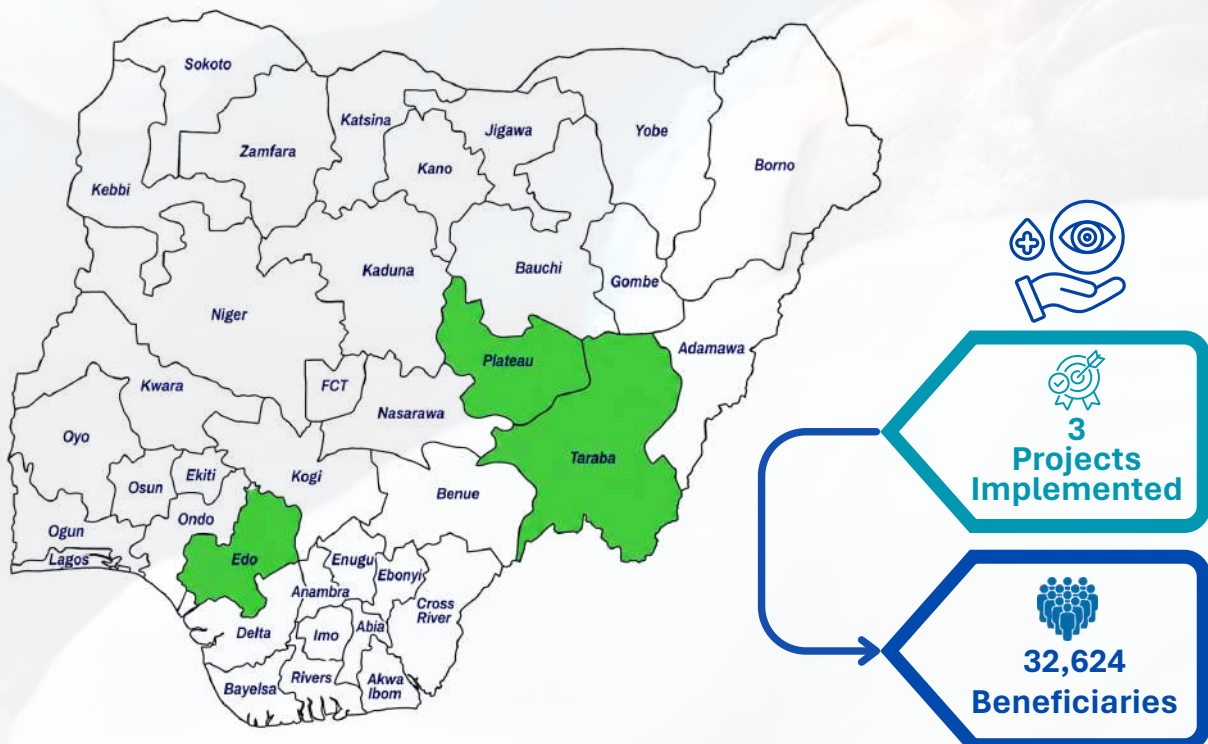
Preventable Blindness

The Foundation’s Vision for a Brighter Future Programme, dedicated to reducing preventable blindness, recently conducted two significant free eye health outreach initiatives in Taraba, Edo and Plateau States. These initiatives aimed to improve access to quality eye care for underserved communities.








The interventions offered a range of comprehensive services, including community- and school-based eye screenings, cataract surgeries (including paediatric cases), distribution of corrective eyeglasses, provision of essential medications, and referrals, along with post-operative follow-up reviews.

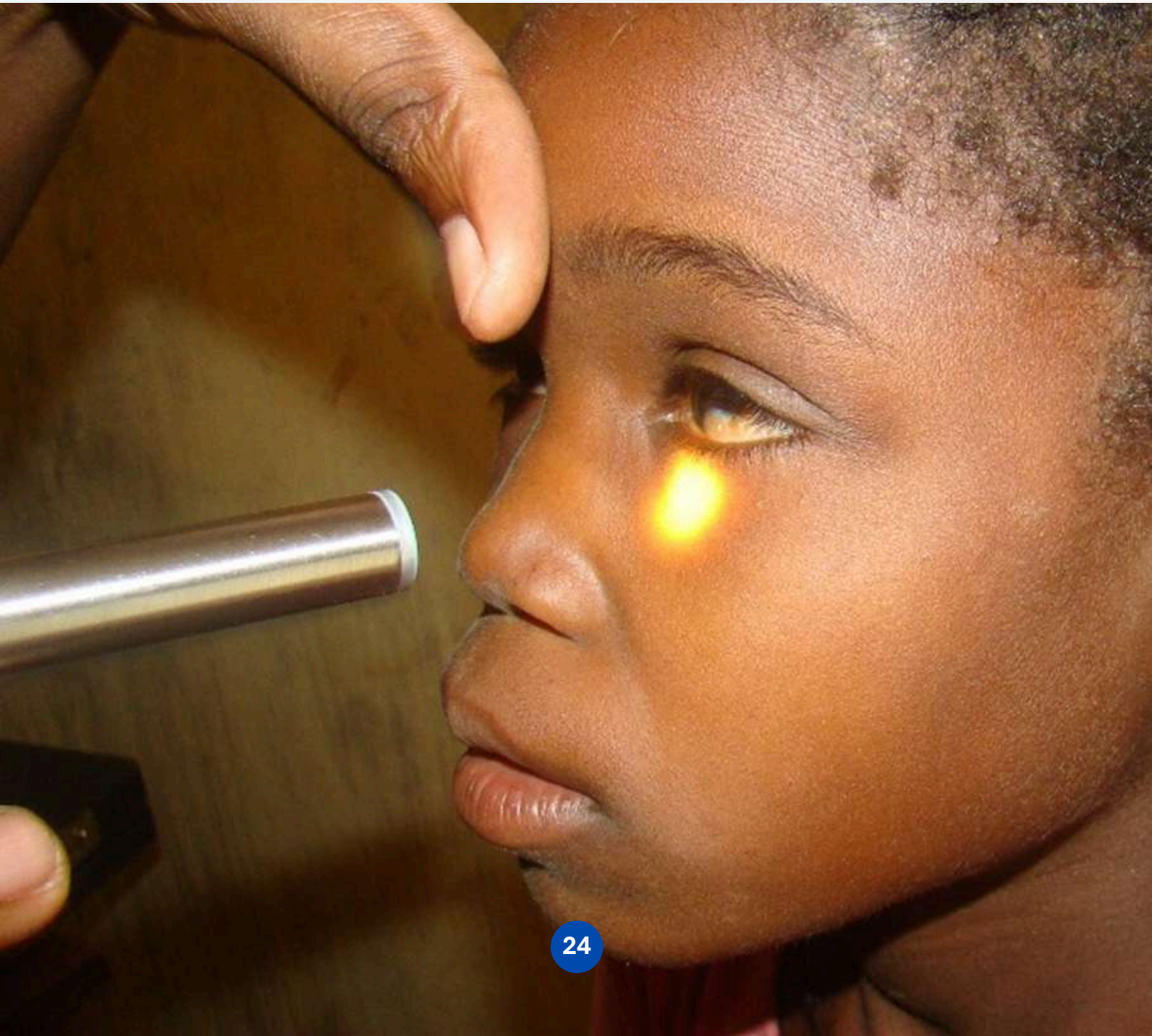
Across these initiatives, over 2,800 beneficiaries received critical eye health services, leading to several positive outcomes. Importantly, there was improved identification of vision-related learning difficulties among schoolchildren, highlighting the strong link between eye health and educational achievement.

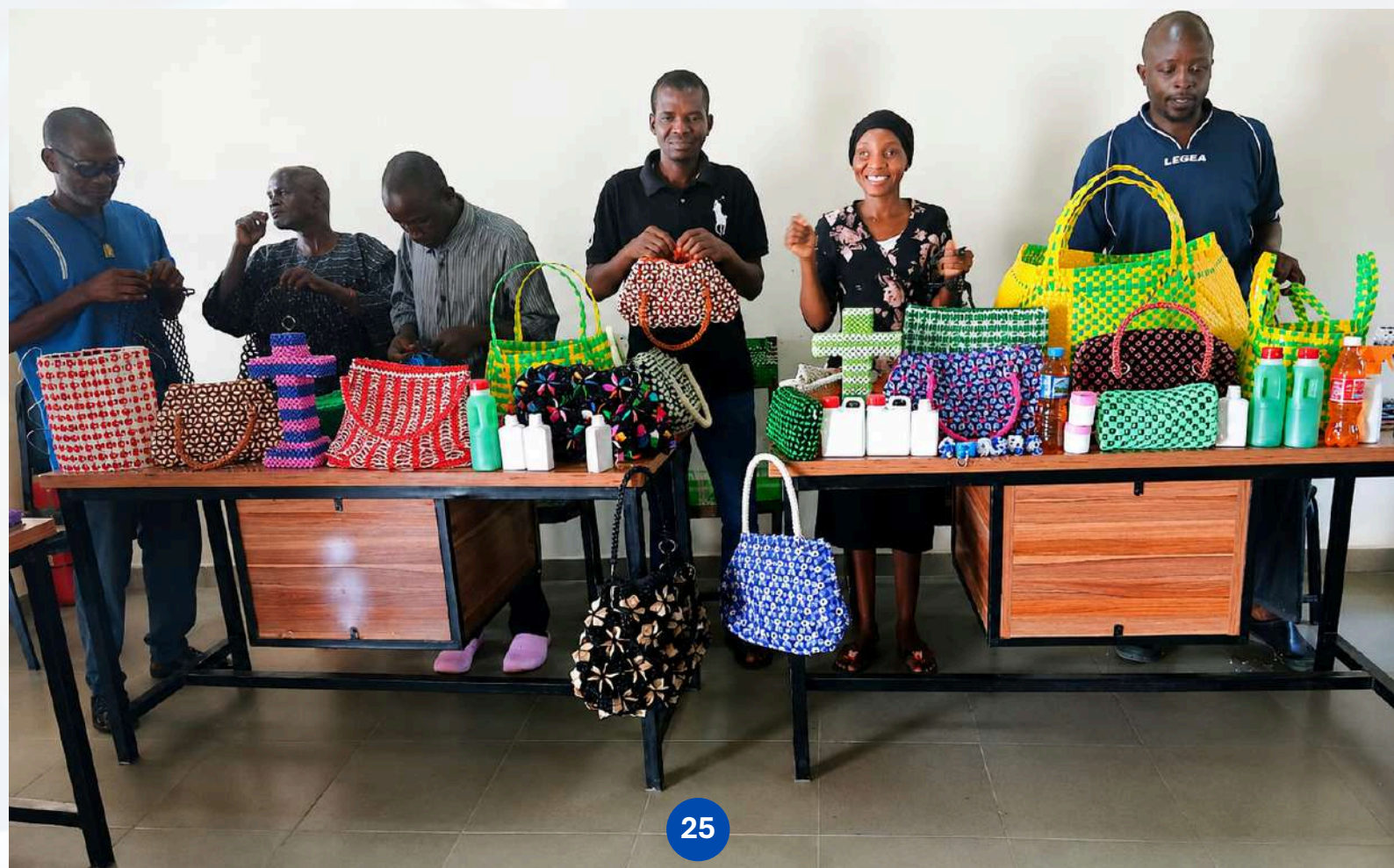


Rehabilitation Services for the Blind

As part of the Foundation's dedication to eye health, individuals with visual impairments in Kaduna State received comprehensive rehabilitation services designed to enhance their quality of life and foster self-reliance. The interventions encompassed counselling and psychosocial support, educational scholarships, vocational and computer skills training, and grant-based empowerment initiatives. These efforts have strengthened social inclusion and contributed to improved economic independence among beneficiaries.

Daisy Danjuma Eye Hospital

The TY Danjuma Foundation has sustained its commitment to eye health through the Daisy Danjuma Eye Hospital, which seeks to bridge critical gaps in specialised ophthalmic services.

The facility delivers comprehensive diagnostic, optometric, and surgical eye care for both adults and children. It places strong emphasis on preventing blindness and providing timely interventions to preserve vision.

Throughout the year, the hospital has played a vital role in enabling early diagnosis and effective vision correction. Its services include routine eye examinations, refraction, prescription of eyeglasses, and essential ophthalmic surgeries—most notably for cataracts. By prioritising these key areas, the Daisy Danjuma Eye Hospital helps individuals maintain good vision, prevent vision loss, and significantly improve their quality of life.

Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs)

Building on its long-standing commitment to addressing Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs) in Taraba State, the TY Danjuma Foundation continues to collaborate closely with key partners to generate evidence confirming the elimination of onchocerciasis and lymphatic filariasis as public health concerns in the region.

Following approval from the National Onchocerciasis Elimination Committee, the NTDs programme in Taraba State has advanced to the entomological assessment phase after successfully completing the epidemiological assessment. This critical phase aims to map and verify the interruption of onchocerca volvulus transmission, marking a significant step towards elimination.

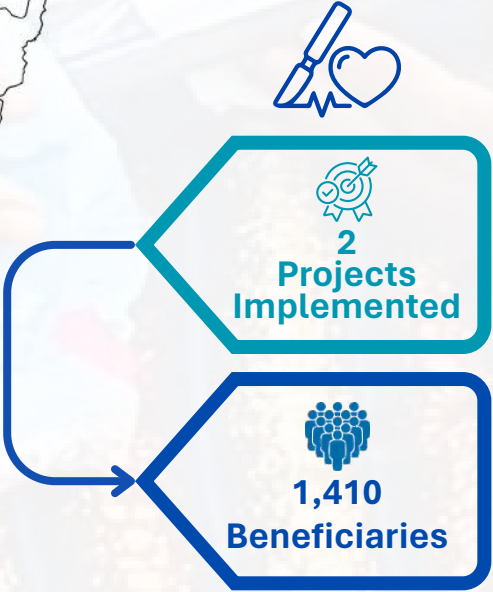
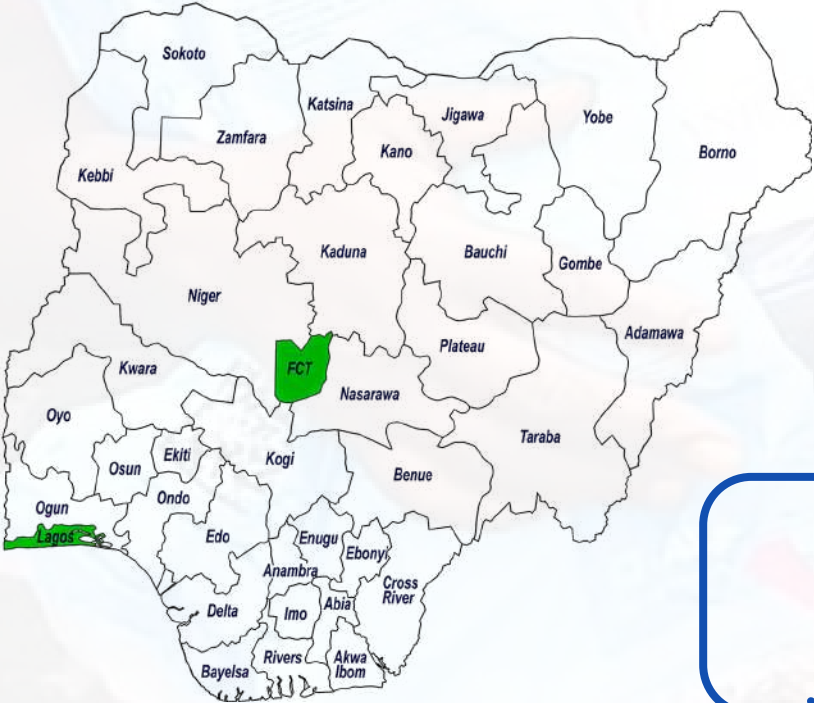
Free Medical & Surgical Outreaches

According to the World Health Organization (2023), less than 70% of Nigerians have access to any form of health insurance, leaving many without financial protection against healthcare costs. This leads to high out-of-pocket spending and restricted access to essential care.









In 2025, the TY Danjuma Foundation expanded its support for economically disadvantaged groups by providing access to free medical and surgical services in Lagos State and the Federal Capital Territory (FCT). As a result, 1,410 individuals received life-changing treatments for complex conditions, including maxillofacial deformities.

Additionally, the Foundation strengthened the capacity of health workers to enhance service delivery. Through these initiatives, the TY Danjuma Foundation continues to strengthen healthcare systems, reduce the burden of illness, and foster healthier, more productive communities across Nigeria.

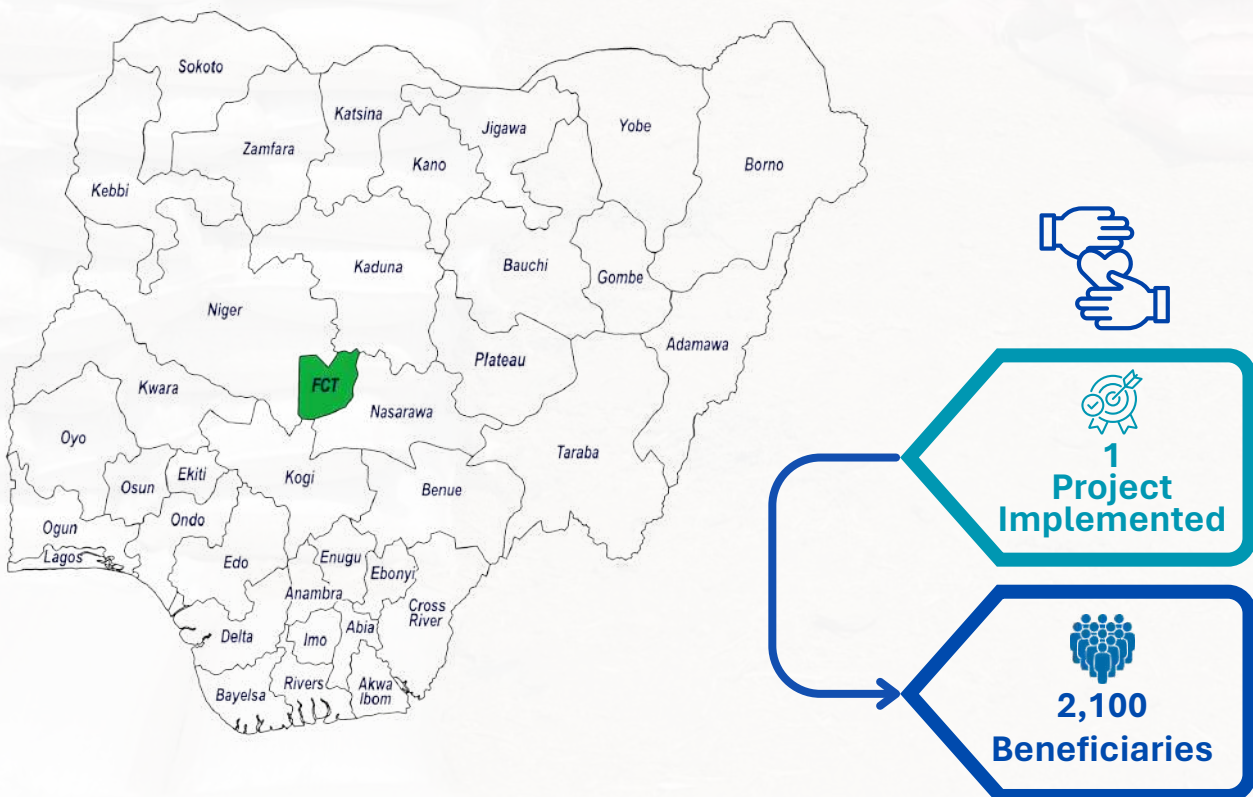


Humanitarian Response

The TY Danjuma Foundation sustained its commitment to supporting internally displaced persons (IDPs) in the Federal Capital Territory (FCT). Through targeted humanitarian efforts at the Wassa IDP settlement, the Foundation distributed micronutrient-rich and general food items to 300 displaced households. This initiative directly benefited 2,100 IDPs and contributed significantly to reducing malnutrition among vulnerable families.

The programme also prioritised maternal and child nutrition. Pregnant and lactating women received training on Infant and Young Child Feeding in Emergencies (IYCF-E) practices to promote optimal feeding and care for children under five. Additionally, all under-five children were screened for malnutrition, given Vitamin A supplementation and Albendazole, and malnourished children received comprehensive support to help them return to a healthy nutritional status.

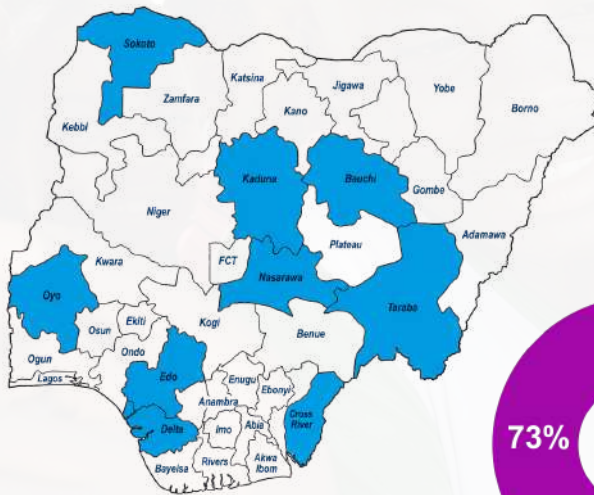
Overview of 2025 Education Programme

In 2025, the Foundation supported eight projects under its Enhancing Access to Quality Education Programme. Focused on teacher training, learning materials, student mental health, and leadership development, the initiatives emphasised sustainability and local ownership.

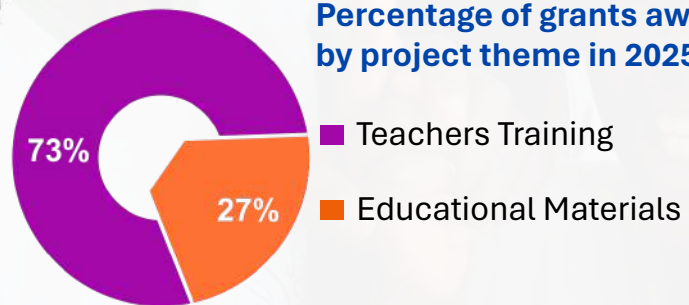
These interventions improved teaching quality, student performance, and school effectiveness, strengthening the Foundation’s role in tackling Nigeria’s education challenges.

Geographical Spread of 2025 Education Projects

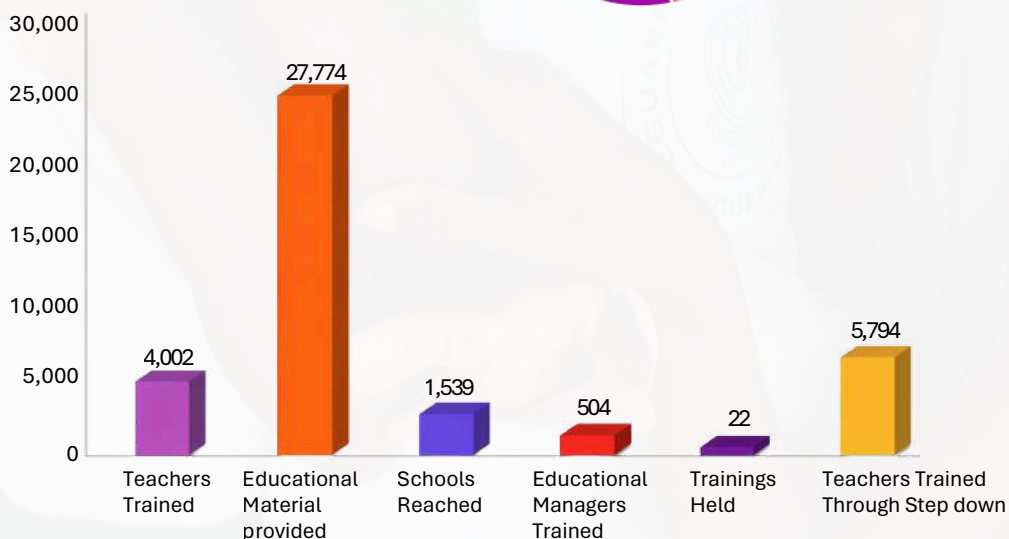
The map below shows the geographical spread of education projects across Nigeria in 2025.

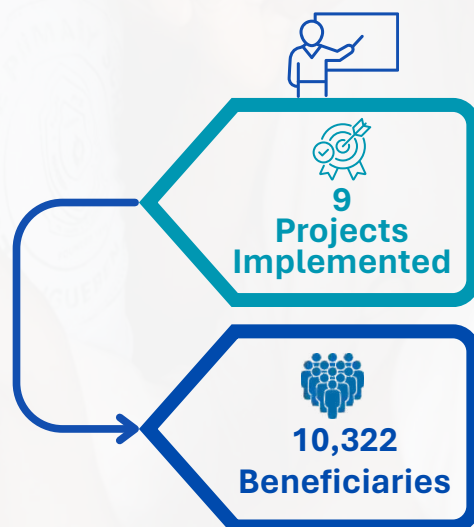
Improving Teaching Quality

In 2025, the Foundation recorded significant progress toward its strategic education objectives. Through sustained investment in teacher development, learning resources, and institutional strengthening, the programme achieved measurable improvements in teaching quality, learning environments, and overall system effectiveness.

A total of 4,002 teachers received direct training, while an additional 5,794 teachers were reached through step-down training methods. This brought the total number of teachers impacted to 9,796. To support effective teaching and learning, 27,774 educational materials were distributed across beneficiary schools, significantly enhancing classroom instruction and learner engagement.

The programme extended its support to 1,539 schools, thereby expanding access to quality education in targeted communities. Additionally, 504 education managers and supervisors were trained to strengthen leadership, monitoring, and accountability within the education system. Furthermore, 22 structured training sessions were organized to ensure effective coordination and sustainability of these capacity-building initiatives. Overall, the programme supported 10,322 beneficiaries and implemented 9 projects.

These results reflect a well-coordinated, scalable, and results-oriented approach that successfully strengthened the education ecosystem. The Foundation remains committed to delivering high-quality education outcomes through continued investment in teachers, resources, and institutional capacity.





TY Danjuma Academy, Takum

In a significant move to enhance the quality of education in Nigeria, the TY Danjuma Foundation established the TY Danjuma Academy, a state-of-the-art multigrade school located in Takum, Taraba State. The academy was officially inaugurated by His Royal Majesty, Barrister Sopiya Ahmadu, Gboshi III, the Chief of Takum. This educational complex represents a substantial investment in delivering world-class education to Nigerians at the grassroots level.

The academy is designed to foster a holistic learning experience and features modern facilities, including computer laboratories, an indoor gymnasium, a football pitch, a playground, and a cafeteria. These amenities support dynamic multigrade teaching. With a dedicated team of 40 staff members trained in the Child Protection Policy and the Family Teaching Model of discipline, the academy prioritizes a safe and nurturing environment where students can thrive. Committed to promoting holistic education, the academy focuses on the physical and spiritual development of students while cultivating compassionate leaders.

Partnership with the World Health Organization

Building upon the Foundation's ongoing efforts to enhance access to quality and affordable healthcare, in June 2025, the World Health Organization (WHO) and the TY Danjuma Foundation established a strategic partnership through a flexible ten-year grant aimed at strengthening Nigeria's health system.


This long-term collaboration supports initiatives to reduce maternal and under-five mortality rates while addressing significant care gaps within the Primary Health Care (PHC) system in underserved regions such as Taraba, Edo, and Enugu States, with the goal of improving public health outcomes in Nigeria.

Through this partnership, the Foundation and WHO are aligning their efforts with national reform priorities, including the Nigeria Health Sector Renewal Investment Initiative (NHSRII) and the Health Sector Strategic Blueprint (2023–2027).




Key Achievements


1. Capacity building of health workers



150 frontline healthcare workers were trained in Essential Newborn Care (ENCC) and Integrated Management of Childhood Illness (IMCI)




Training improved skills in neonatal resuscitation, infant feeding, recognising danger signs, and managing common childhood illnesses.




Baseline assessments showed limited prior training, making the capacity building highly impactful.


2. Strengthening health planning and governance



WHO supported the development of the National Annual Operational Plan (AOP) for 2026.




Over 350 state and local officials received training in leadership, assessment, and planning.




States established Maternal and Neonatal Mortality Reduction Initiative (MAMII) workplans and task forces, promoting coordinated, data-driven decision-making.

2. Strengthened WHO operational capacity



Flexible donor funding allowed WHO Nigeria to respond quickly to emerging needs and address underfunded priorities.



It reinforced WHO's role as a key technical partner and boosted operational capacity nationwide

Nonprofit Capacity Development

The TY Danjuma Foundation collaborated with the Nigeria Network of NGOs (NNGO) to provide training for nonprofits, focusing on strengthening their operational capacity for optimal performance. The training highlighted essential principles and practices of nonprofit management, while also connecting nonprofit staff to valuable mentoring, coaching, and peer-to-peer networking opportunities.

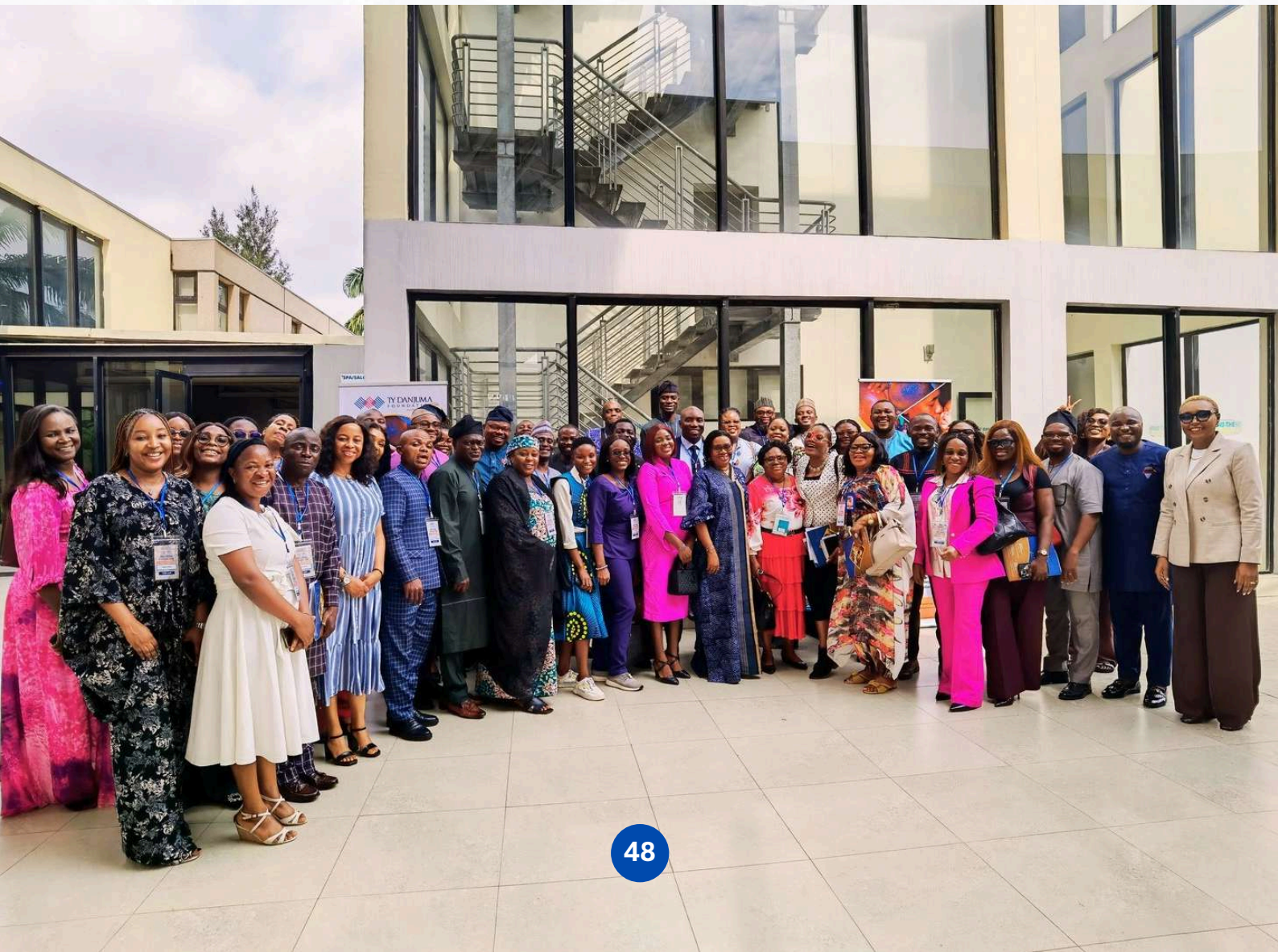


Mid-term Evaluation of 2022-2027 Strategic Plan

The TY Danjuma Foundation conducted a mid-term evaluation of its 2022–2027 Strategic Plan to assess progress toward its goals.

Using a mixed-methods approach, the evaluation combined document reviews, surveys, and stakeholder consultations. It examined the Foundation’s five strategic goals and included validation meetings with over 80 participants.

The findings highlight significant progress in achieving the set objectives, particularly in health, humanitarian response, and grant-making. Addressing the identified gaps will be crucial to maximizing impact during the final phase of the Strategic Plan.

TYDF in the News

The Foundation garnered significant attention, showcasing our initiatives and successes through various media channels, highlighting our dedication to improving lives globally and strengthening communities.

1. Enugu communities celebrate as T.Y. Danjuma Foundation opens N38m bridge to health facility:

Residents of the neglected Enugu slum communities-Umuchigbo, Ifo, Ugbo-Ezeji, and Ugbo-Paul-have received much-needed relief with the commissioning of a N38 million bridge across the Avah River. The bridge now connects these communities to the Goodwill Medical Centre, a state-of-the-art health facility built by the T.Y. Danjuma Foundation.
